A low percentage of all children have a seizure when younger than 15 years, half of which are febrile seizures (seizure brought on by a fever). One of every 100 children has epilepsy-recurring seizures. A febrile seizure occurs when a child contracts an illness such as an ear

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infection, cold, or chickenpox accompanied by fever. Febrile seizures are the most common type of seizure seen in children.

Childhood absence epilepsy (CAE) This

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syndrome starts between the ages of 4 and 10 and can affect up to 12% of children with epilepsy under 16. Absence seizures happen frequently and are very brief, lasting only a few seconds. Because of this they often go unnoticed.

Childhood absence epilepsy (CAE)

typically begins between 4 and 8 years of age. Absence seizures are the main seizure type. These are brief staring spells during

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which the child is not aware or responsive. Each seizure lasts about 10 to 20 seconds and ends abruptly. Without treatment, seizures typically occur many times a day.
